Provo Pillar: Forward-Looking

In a true spirit of partnership, Provo City, Utah County, the State of Utah and the Federal Aviation Administration broke ground on the new Provo Airport Terminal on November 5, 2019 with a combined \$47 million infrastructure investment.

The economic momentum created from this forward-looking vision has already created eight new destinations, with each new roundtrip destination bringing a potential \$15 million into our local, regional and state economy.

Our continued commitment to foundational infrastructure has now positioned Provo as the second busiest airport in Utah greatly expanding our regional and statewide economic potential, as well as our geographic ability to partner with the Salt Lake International Airport and other airports in the region to foster commercial air growth in the future.





WINTER FIRE SAFETY

During wintertime and the holiday seasons, there is a greater risk of home fires. However, these fires can be prevented by following a few simple safety tips:

- Make sure you have working smoke and carbon monoxide detectors in your home.
- Keep anything flammable at least 3 feet away from any portable heating unit. Plug only one heating unit into an electrical outlet at a time.
- Have a professional inspect your chimney and vents each year.
- Store cooled ashes outside in an airtight metal container at least 10 feet from your home or any building.
- Keep candles 12 inches away from anything that can burn. Consider using battery-powered candles.
- Do not plug multiple extension cords together. Never run an extension cord under rugs or furniture.

What to Know when it Snows

With the cool winter weather here, Provo crews are prepared for any snowstorm coming our way. We our always monitoring current weather conditions. Snowplow crews are on call, so when snow starts to accumulate they get to work. These crews spend long hours clearing streets during and after the storm. A six inch snow storm takes 24 hours in order to plow the entire city one time. The longest snow removal operation in the last 30 years lasted 36 hours. The priority of our crews is to clear heavily trafficked streets including arterial and collector roads. After this is accomplished priority then shifts to residential and secondary streets. UDOT has their own snow removal crews who take care of state-owned roads. which includes I-15, State Street, University Avenue, Geneva Road, and parts of University Parkway, Center Street, 500 West, and 300 South in Provo. An important

reminder is to give snowplows plenty of space. Residents are responsible for clearing sidewalks around their home within 24 hours after the snow stops falling. When clearing snow remember to

make sure it stays on your property and not thrown into the road.

THE DAILY HERALD

Started in 1873, the Daily Herald has been the voice of Utah County for 158 years, and is one of, if not the oldest business in Provo.

On Dec. 1, the Daily Herald moved its offices to the Provo Towne Centre. The Herald is located next to Standard Optical on the first level of the mall. Residents can subscribe, place ads and do business at that location.

"The Herald has always been the community's paper, offering news, sports and entertainment as well as national and local advertising," said Craig Conover, advertising director. "In our new location we are in the community and excited to continue strengthening those relationships."

While news and the way it is covered is changing with technology, the Herald's commitment to Utah Valley and covering the news has not. As it opens in the Towne Centre it will continue to be the number one source of information for Provo and Utah County.


PROVO PARTY ANIMALS NEW YEAR'S EVE EVENT

Construction is moving forward steadily with a clear finish line in sight at the new PVU terminal. Parking lots and access roads are 90% paved, walls have been built, and utility installations are just about complete. At this point, much of the work is now moving to the terminal's interior finish. Baggage claim carousels are installed, airline counters are taking shape and you can almost see the first flight coming into one of the four new gates.

THE DESIGN

The forward-thinking design of the new terminal will not only provide more gates and destinations for traveling; it also incorporates many anticipated needs and wants for residents and those traveling to Provo. An airy, glass-walled reunification room where families and friends can see flights coming in and welcome back loved ones, including missionaries, will be a highlight of the terminal. Offices and conference rooms were incorporated for our own airport staff, as well as offices for TSA, multiple airlines, and other entities. Down to the smallest detail of a relief room for service animals, an astounding amount of forethought and planning have gone into the new terminal.

THE LOCAL: Several concessionaire spaces and kiosk spots were planned out for local eateries to occupy and welcome travelers to Provo with a variety of many delicious local food options. Multiple car rental booths with a large car rental lot will make getting around town a quick and easy convenience for visitors.

THE INFLUENCE: Downtown Provo, and most specifically Center Street, contributed significantly to the final terminal aesthetic design. Once through security and waiting for flights, travelers will see that influence clearly in the red-bricked business fronts with the classic awnings of Center Street.

THE CONVENIENCE: Multiple airline counters and Airport self-check-in kiosks will make checking in for flights a quick and easy experience. Expanded, streamlined areas for security checks and a convenient baggage claim area are designed to get travelers, whether coming or going, to their destinations as quickly as possible. Safety and security are of the highest priority for airports, and PVU staff have been working tirelessly with the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) and Transportation Security Administration (TSA) over the past two years to ensure everything meets and exceeds all safety requirements and standards.

THE COST SAVINGS

Purchasing much of the building and construction supplies well in advance of the actual construction of the building saved approximately 2-3 million dollars due to the rising cost of building supplies over the past year and a half.

Provo City's Public Works employees have been working on this project since late 2019. Our crews cleared overgrown vegetation and debris, installed two moat crossings, placed an embankment for the new access road, and are currently installing the last of the utilities. This work has saved Provo City just under two million dollars in labor costs, and we are extremely grateful for their dedication and coordinated efforts.

FORWARD-LOOKING

In early November, Allegiant started new services to Austin and Houston, Texas, as well as Palm Springs, California. We continue to look forward to the announcements of future routes. With the continuing expansion of the Provo Airport, we will be able to provide a higher volume of flights, allowing plenty of travel opportunities for those in our community.

With heartfelt thanks to our current and former mayors for their support, and the many forward-thinking minds of all those who have taken part in this once-in-a-lifetime project, we can now look forward to opening this new terminal in June 2022.
